

BISHOPS PLAN TO RESTRUCTURE THE DIOCESE:

Back in 2012, Archbishop Mancini released his Pentecost Pastoral Letter calling for the refoundation of our local church and committed us to undertake the challenge of New Evangelization. After many years of hard work, we are now to the point where we are starting to implement these changes. The diocese of Halifax/Yarmouth is presently made up of 65 parishes and 25 missions. The diocese is reorganizing these parishes into 20 new parishes. In Canon Law, a parish can be an area and not just a building. This means that churches will keep their church names but the area they are in will have a new name. WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR US, HERE AT ST. AMBROSE AND FOR OUR LADY OF LOURDES? Because we have already closed many churches, we will be staying the same and not combining with other churches. But there is still some work to be done for us. REFLECTION: The prophet Isaiah refuses to be silent. The Psalmist urges us to "Proclaim God's marvelous deeds to all the nations" (Psalm 96:3). St. Paul reminds us that the Holy Spirit has given us a variety of gifts that should be used for the benefit of the Church. Mary speaks to her Son at a wedding feast because the waiters had run out of wine.

Silence may be an important element in our liturgy, but it should never be the hallmark of a Christian life. Our baptism calls us to be heralds of the Good News. While it is, indeed, important to sing God's praise and to proclaim the Gospel in our liturgies, it is equally important to demand justice when we see wrongs; to speak up for those who have no voice; to decry the mistreatment of refugees and immigrants; and to address the needs of the poor. As ministers of the Church, we need to be involved beyond the choir loft, the sanctuary, and the church doors.

Jesus showed us how to do this-he encountered people as they were, where they were. He addressed their needs or corrected their errors. He taught us commandments to follow and beatitudes to live by. So, perhaps his Mother's words to the waiters still offer us the best advice: "Do whatever he tells you" (John 2:5).
