



## WELCOME TO OUR NEW ARCHBISHOP: On April



13, 2019, Pope Francis appointed Most Rev. Brian Dunn as the Coadjutor Archbishop of the Archdiocese of Halifax-Yarmouth. From that time,

Archbishop Dunn served with Archbishop Anthony Mancini in Halifax until November 27, 2020, when Archbishop Mancini retired from his office on his 75<sup>th</sup> birthday. At that time, Archbishop Dunn immediately became the Archbishop of the of Halifax-Yarmouth. Archdiocese Archbishop Dunn comes to the diocese after serving for 10 years as the Bishop of Antigonish, and before that, serving as an Auxiliary Bishop of Sault Ste-Marie, Ontario after his episcopal ordination on October 9, 2008. Archbishop Dunn was born in St. John's, Newfoundland, on January 8, 1955 and was ordained to the priesthood on August 28, 1980. He was then assigned to a number of parishes in the Diocese of Grand Falls until 1988, when he enrolled at Saint Paul University in Ottawa in studies in Canon Law and completed his Doctoral studies in 1991. In September 1919, he was assigned to parish ministry at the Cathedral in Grand Falls, NL. He also worked as Vice-Chancellor and later Chancellor for the Diocese of Grand Falls as well as being involved in teaching theology and pastoral ministry with the Atlantic School of Theology. In 2002, he joined the faculty at St. Peter's Seminary, in London, Ontario and from 2005 until 2008, he had served as Dean of Studies. He was ordained as a bishop in Grand Falls-Windsor, NL and served as Auxiliary Bishop of Sault Ste-Marie, Ontario until January 2010. He was installed as the Bishop of Antigonish on January 25, 2010.

FYI: Anonymous letter about the priest not wearing a mask at the Consecration: I recently received an anonymous letter in the collection about the priest not wearing a mask during the Consecration. It was said in this note that I am breathing on the hosts. I just want to assure people that this is not true. The Hosts you receive are in a covered ciborium which stays covered for the whole mass until it's time for people to receive (except for the one that I consume). I also purify my hands a few times during mass, like before I set up the altar, and then again after I put on my mask, I purify my hands once more before I pick up the ciborium to distribute Communion. Please know that we follow all the many pages of guidelines set out by the diocese and by Dr. Strang. If you are uncomfortable receiving Jesus during this time of COVID-19, then an option might be to come up for a blessing at Communion time. ## **REFLECTIONS:** Second Sunday of Advent



"A voice of one crying out in the Reflections desert. 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths." Mark 1:3 On this, the Second Sunday of Advent,

we are given the person of St. John the Baptist to ponder. What a gift he is! Jesus Himself stated that "among those born of women there has been none greater than John the Baptist". What a compliment! What is it that made John so great? We can point to two things in particular. The first has to do with his calling and the second has to do with his virtue.

First of all, John was great because he was the transition from the Old Testament Prophets to the New Testament. He was the bridge that prepared for the new life to come. His unique mission makes him truly great. But John was great not only because of his unique calling, he was also great because of the virtue he had in his life. And it is this gift that is worth pondering for our own inspiration more than any other. The particular virtue that John had was that of humility. He saw himself as nothing other than a "voice of one crying out in the desert." And the Word he spoke was Jesus. John acknowledged that he was not even worthy to stoop down and untie the sandal straps of Jesus (Mark 1:7). He was praised by many and followed by many and yet he continuously said of Jesus that "He must increase and I must decrease". John was not in it for praise and honor; rather, his mission was to point everyone to the Savior of the world. He could have sought the honor and praise of many and he would have certainly received it. They may have even made him king. But John was more than willing to fulfill his mission and then submit himself to the cruel sword of his executioner. His humility was such that he was focused only on Jesus and desired only to point to Him. Reflect, today, upon this humility in your own life. Do you tend to point to vourself or to Christ? Do you seek the praise of others or do you humbly point all praise and glory to God? Humility is the path that St. John the Baptist took and it's the path we must strive for each and every day. ~*My* Catholic Life
